VICE PRESIDENT / CLUB & MEMBER DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Firstly, I would just like to thank everyone at this club and the time you commit from your busy life's to volunteering and serving the community and its people.

As vice-president of our dearest club, it is my pleasure to spend extra time finding ways of making your experience more enjoyable. That could not be achieved without the team of board members that also work hard to improve the quality of our services and keep our family-friendly focus.

Successes and Challenges

2024 has brought a breath of fresh air to our club and our members. This season marked our second year with 'no restrictions', and without it, fosters a club lifestyle that returns to a family-friendly focus. Like all other volunteer industries and adjacent lifesaving clubs, there are still wounds recovering from the pandemic. We have been making a great recovery with support from our nipper parents/ kids, operational members, training team, club athletes, and LSV.

Improvements 2023-2024 season:

- Increased number of nipper enrolment
- New ATV
- Increasing social functions
- SLSC Survey
- New IRB Motor washout container
- IRB racing season

Ongoing challenges:

- Slow recruitment of operational/ patrol members
- Difficulty rostering patrols
- Outdated website
- Limited attendance on LSV programs

Though some significant challenges persist, we have come a good way from the previous season. Despite the challenges, we are still able to provide adequate protection to our community in addition to improving the quality and experience of our nipper's program. Our patrol members have continued to show adversity despite challenges. Without these incredible people that give a portion of their weekend and sometimes public holidays to support the safety of the people that come to the beach, the club would not be able to provide the nipper program we currently have. In addition to patrols, some of our operational members provide water safety so that our nippers can be safe and supported as they learn fundamental skills.

Nipper Parents and kids are an important pillar of our services. It was great to see more people continue from the previous season, as well as some new members join our club. We hope that you continue to have a good experience with us and for our new members, welcome to the family!

Despite challenging pressures to the cost of living and new circumstances which have raised from/ and after covid19, it has been good to see so many parents engaged in the program and giving their kids vital experience's, teamwork, connectedness, swimming skills, exercise, and more.

Social events have happened more often, and its great to see our small club connect with each other outside of lifesaving. The relationships that we form within the club can lead to long-lasting friendships and build on connectedness, which is an essential component of healthy lifestyles.

These programs could not be improved without the dedication and collaboration of our board members. It has been great this year to see new ideas and ways of refining the quality of experience to our members and our community. These include the continued work for a new ramp for disabled persons to access, purchasing new equipment such as a new ATV and motor washout container, increasing social functions, and the SLSC survey.


Seaford Lifesaving Club Survey

The SLSC survey is a brand-new initiative which we hope will improve the quality of service to our members. Despite the satisfaction we see when speaking to our members, there has never been recorded data to show this. Surveys hold significant weight in the support of decision making, showing members how they view the club, and which areas require more focus/improvement.

This season's survey aims to assess multiple areas:

- 1. Member preferences for areas of improvement
- 2. Member satisfaction of our key services
- 3. LSV values, and how much members agree the club is providing

All the results will be provided in the survey report coming later this year. However, I have some results which are very exciting to share. Some of the exciting results are what our members chose to be an area they would like to see improvement.



The results from this figure have been collated by several selections made by participants of the survey. There was a large list of items which could be chosen from, however the areas that members would like the club to focus on more are fitness (running/ swimming events), education (more resourcing and equipment), operational scenarios, club participation in LSV events, and lastly fundraising.

The table below represents the level of satisfaction our members expressed when asked to rate their experience in the key areas of our club and additionally how satisfied they are overall with the club.

Lastly, members were asked to rate how likely they were to recommend the club to others by providing a score which ranged from 1 (very unlikely) to 10 (very likely). It is amazing to see the results from our members.

It's with pleasure that I present the Life Saving Operations Report, as Lifesaving Operations Manager for Seaford Life Saving Club.

Firstly, a huge thankyou to all for supporting our Clubs Lifesaving activities.

The past season has again shown continued growth with meeting our patrol obligations. Lifesaving Operations is responsible to ensure the club fulfills the State based "Patrol Protocol". We must reach minimum requirements and adhere to all Regulations, Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) and Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) requirements.

We had a successful patrol season and met our commitments to Life Saving Victoria (LSV). However, we still have the challenge to increase our patrol numbers and key awards to help spread the load across our valued volunteer base.

I would like to thank all our volunteers (and family support) that helped us keep Seaford beach safer by offering time to patrol, every patrol hour helps and is much appreciated.

- 1506 volunteer patrol hours
- 2 rescues recorded.
- Beach attendance ~25102 (during patrol times)
- ~414 preventive actions

The above grid confirms the training sessions held at Seaford Life Saving Club in the 2023/2024 season. We had a strong group of trainees this season who contributed to water safety and patrols throughout the year. As a result we saw one of the most successful nippers programmes in a while and this was due to the high level of water safety volunteers. We delivered our first bridging bronze session, which we will continue to offer each year in addition to new awards. This is for SRC's who wish to upskill and become full Bronze medallion holders, without having to complete the whole unit again. A massive congratulations to our newest award holders who completed their assessment in really tricky conditions and in the company of our resident seal.

Thank you to Peter Stones, who helped to deliver training independently, allowing for groups to learn at differentiated times, focusing on the key skills required for their awards. We are also proud that we were able to complete skills maintenance training to 39 returning volunteers, despite the usual weather and water quality challenges.

Just look at these fabulous new recruits. We also want to welcome the Littler family who joined us from Bonbeach and have been a really great asset to Seaford, in the form of competition and the support they have provided as water safety and patrol members.



JUNIOR OPERATIONS (NIPPERS) REPORT

We had a fantastic season for 2023/24, with the change from Saturday afternoon to Friday nights making it possible for more Nipper families to join the program.

There were more than 80 Nippers registered at the start of the season, with an increase mainly in the Under 6 and Under 7 groups, and 66 Nippers received their age group's surf rescue certificate for completing all Life Saving Victoria requirements at the end of the season.

Apart from the scheduling change, our expanded coordination team of Jen Arch, Samone Cranston and myself set some main goals of ensuring a good mix of practical and theory sessions; increasing the number of age managers available; encouraging more parent/carer involvement and importantly, not cancelling any sessions if possible.

We were very pleased to meet those goals and it was just as important to see new and returning Nippers enjoying the program, and hopefully coming back next season.

The program was reduced from the previous 15 weeks down to 12 to avoid previous issues with low Nipper and age managers' numbers during school and public holidays, which helped maintain interest and enthusiasm from the group and foster a sense of community. More regular barbecues, icy poles and award giveaways didn't hurt either!

While we had more water safety volunteers than in recent seasons, we were still limited in the number of nippers we could have in the water. We also had to plan use of equipment carefully as we don't have enough boards, flags for multiple groups.

Some difficult weather conditions cut down the number of competition sessions we could hold but the kids all took part in the main competition day and a nipper versus patrol event. Our age managers and parent helpers provided welcome support over the season, and we can't thank them enough for their involvement. These programs rely on volunteers to be successful and having help every week made the coordination job easier.

We will also continue working on training up new age managers for next season and encourage anyone interested in supporting the program to contact the club.

The presentation night, held at Seaford Primary, was a great celebration of a successful season and the friendships made by kids and parents over that time.

We're looking forward to another big season in 2024/25 and can't wait to see you on the

beach.

We started to get a feel for the season during the Open Day session that we ran at the club in August 2023, where I spent the day answering many questions and enquiries from mainly new families interested in joining the nipper program.

We were able to gauge from this day & other feedback that a Friday night might be the night to successfully run the program in 23/24. And this is the Night we successfully trialed for season 23/24.

From when we opened the memberships applications in early September, we were inundated with new applications for the nipper program especially in the U/6, U/7, U/8 age groups & had to maintain a spreadsheet on the steady flow of numbers of existing and new memberships coming in.

Overall, in season 23/24 we had - 88 Family Groups at Seaford Life Saving Club consisting of 40 active patrolling members (both SRC and bronze members), 90 nippers ranging ages from u/6 up to u/13 age groups. There were many new Nipper families this year, I am hoping I see you all renew your memberships for Season 24/25.

A very successful season was had in 23/24 in terms of membership, and I will be back again next season to do it all again.
