VICE PRESIDENT / CLUB & MEMBER DEVELOPMENT REPORT

We have emerged out of the Covid-19 pandemic! Now begins the journey to improving the club we know and love.

Firstly, I am grateful to have recently been appointed the vice president position and be seated alongside the amazing, loyal, and driven board members. The Board of Management at our club have been vigilant, adaptive, and innovative during the response to the ever-changing circumstances of the pandemic in which I give my upmost respect to all involved. Thanks to this fortunate position, I aim to provide a positive impact on the club and its members.

Challenges and Successes

For the first time in the club's history, the last two years had potential to be concerning for individuals worried about contracting the contagious virus and strict precautions limiting the club's lifestyle and family-friendly focus. The pandemic has inflicted a wound on the club, which will take time to heal. Whilst we have experienced our first 'no restrictions' patrol season since pre-pandemic, the dilemmas encountered in the last season are still present.

- Reduced active memberships (i.e., reduced number of members on the beach)
- Reduced nippers on the beach
- Reduced income from community room hire

Although underlying problems appear grim, our members have continued to uphold the club's reputation and provide a safe environment for the community.

Our operational members have continued to protect the beaches by providing supervision, training (new members and requals), first aid, and support. This season we received a significant number of first aid, and preventable incidents that our team attended to. Without our patrolling members, the community would have an increased likelihood of incidents occurring and worsening morbidity.

Our nippers have been incredible this season, by continuing to progress and learn the important skills and knowledge of being safe around the water. Our nippers will also undoubtedly grow to become competent athletes.

Nipper parents are an important pillar of our program, and it's been great to see a number of parents getting involved. With the current challenges that cost of living is placing in the lives of many as well as other commitments a parent/child may have external to the club, parents are still volunteering their time by supporting in water safety, nipper coordination, assistance to volunteers, as well as providing moral support to the nippers.

Each member of Seaford has shown not only adversity in the face of unforeseen circumstances, but also the ability to bounce back and grow, making our members resilient, and giving our young members (nipper and SRC/ young bronze) a potential core experience, which will aid in their development as people and lifesavers.

Member spotlight

I'm giving a special thanks to Grace, Niamh, Shannon, and Peter for their drive and passion to pursue further opportunities within lifesaving.

In 2022, Peter Stones took on the LSV under 18 leadership development camp. The camp is designed for passionate individuals that are driven to improve their skills in leadership, mentoring, and individualism, giving them a head start over others for the next stage in life.

In 2023 Niamh Packer and Grace Mills took on the LSV under 13 development camp. This is an incredibly rewarding experience, with the camp introducing many important life skills such as 'what makes a good leader', working as a team to achieve goals, insight, and tips on LSV/ club progression, as well as many fun activities. The skills also translate outside the club and will help them progress as future leaders.

In 2023, Shannon Harvey completed the Training Officer course. This highly competitive course enables him to assist with the head training officers and later independently teach new and inspiring trainees in various courses and become leaders in the field. Peter Stones along with myself also completed the course, providing the club more capability.

Thank you, all members who have also completed courses this year including Bronze, SRC, ART/FA, Side By side vehicle, and more.

The club aspires to improve the wellbeing and satisfaction of its members. It is with pleasure that I present the Life Saving Operations Report, as Lifesaving Operations Manager for Seaford Life Saving Club.

Firstly, a huge thank you to all for supporting our Clubs Lifesaving activities.

The past season has again shown continued growth with meeting our patrol obligations. Lifesaving Operations is responsible to ensure the club fulfills the State based "Patrol Protocol". We must reach minimum requirements and adhere to all Regulations, Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) and Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) requirements.

We had a successful patrol season and met our commitments to Life Saving Victoria (LSV). However, we still have the challenge to increase our patrol numbers and key awards to help spread the load across our valued volunteer base.

I would like to thank all our volunteers (and family support) that helped us keep Seaford beach safer by offering time to patrol, every patrol hour helps and is much appreciated.

- 1555 volunteer patrol hours
- 7 rescues recorded.
- Beach attendance ~34873 (during patrol times)

The above grid confirms the training sessions held at Seaford Life Saving Club in the 2022/2023 season. As you can see we successfully trained 8 patrol members in ARTFA (Advanced Resuscitation Techniques & First Aid), and 6 brand new water safety/patrol members. This is slightly down on last years numbers where we trained 18 new members. For the next season we are inviting as many members as possible to put up their hands and dive into (see the pun there!) next awards which will be advertised soon. We are planning to share training with neighboring clubs so that we can make it accessible for everyone. As we know time is precious, and in these post Covid times it seems that we have even less time than ever before. We appreciate every single minute that our members give to support SLSC.

We can also welcome new trainers to the club, who have worked tirelessly to achieve their TOC awards, ready to help. Welcome Peter Stones who completed a full season of assistant training in 2022 to help attain his training certificate, as well as trainee trainers Sean Harvey, Shannon Harvey, and Dave O'Brien.

We are excited to offer our ex-Nippers (aged 13-15) the opportunity to achieve their Surf Rescue Certificates (SRC), and welcome some parents who would also like to achieve a lifesaving award or Bronze Medallion. Just look at these fabulous new recruits.



In addition to recruiting new members and new awards, we also re-trained current members. This is known as skills maintenance. This year we retrained 56 skills which included Bronze, SRC and IRB awards.

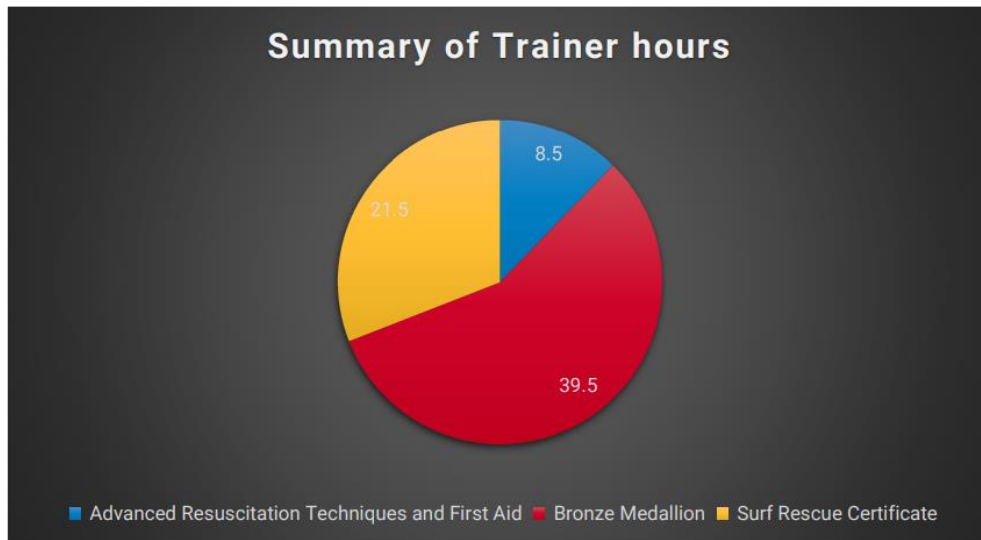

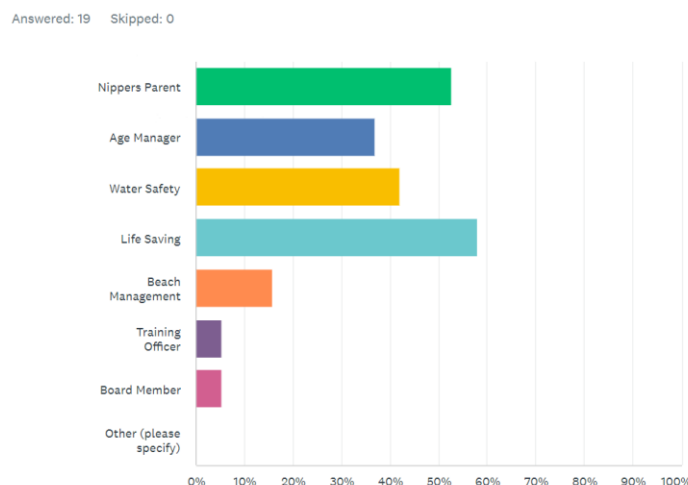

- We have received 19 responses to date which is less than 25% of our members.

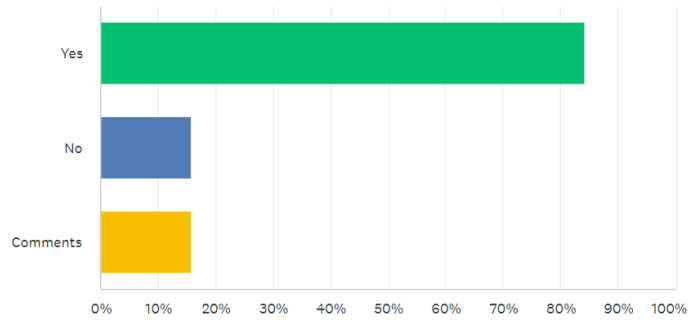
Of those responses it shows us that many members hold multiple roles already, within the club and that 79% joined because of the nipper's program:

Then we asked if you felt that SLSC had met with expectations:

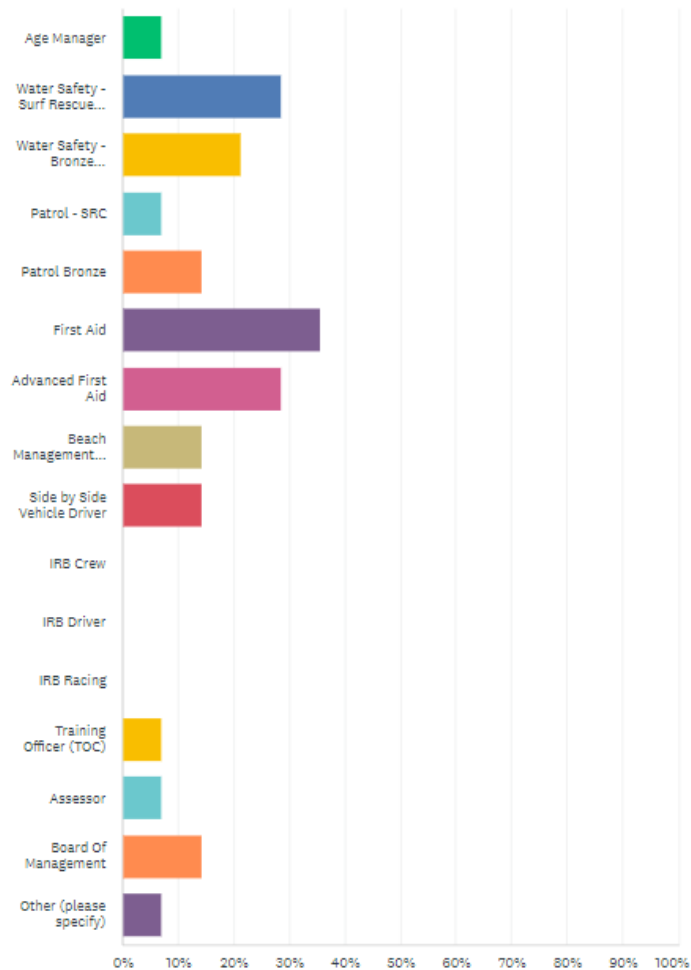
Answered: 19 Skipped: 0

Question 4 asked what training you would like us to provide next season:

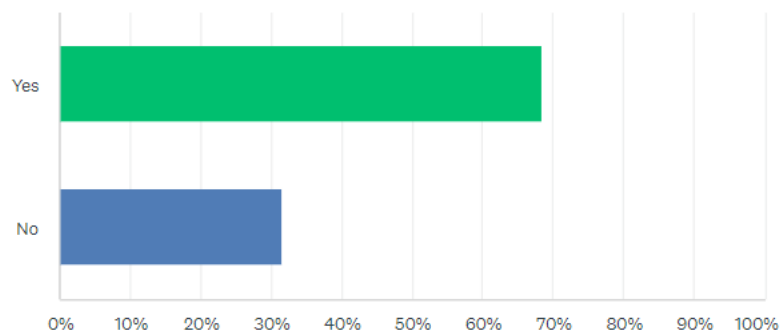
Answered: 14 Skipped: 5



LSV's goal is for all patrolling members to achieve First Aid certificates in 2023/2024 and we encourage members to look at communication for when courses are held. We aim to hold a few courses in the Kingston region. Most replies felt that we did not communicate enough courses at SLSC. Members are welcome to train at any club as a guest and available courses can be found on the Members Training from Anywhere <https://mt.lsv.com.au/login/>. Members are encouraged to apply for courses or why not join as a Board Member so that you can assist in multiple areas.

Finally, we asked if you would be interested in a Winter program in the off season.

For this to be successful, members would be required to run a fitness program, that can utilise the community room in the cold months. We have some limited fitness equipment available to use, and we can plan dry training for both Nippers and patrolling members. This would be a great opportunity to introduce members to the skills required for lifesaving or help members to maintain their fitness during the winter months. The very brave can participate in open water swimming (there is an amazing group of people who swim every day or week at Seaford Pier).

We had a total of 70 Nippers for the season. Our younger age groups were full. This gives us great hope in the future of our club for progression through its ranks for our Nippers to study and train to qualify as Patrol Members.

Our first week kicked off on Saturday 3rd December 2022. The session was full of new faces, both Nippers and their parents. The beach was full of excitement, nerves, sunscreen and rashies. Our new Nippers were decked out in our Nippers rashies in fluoro green, and inaugural Junior Club Captain ready to support the team.

We had 2 sessions called off due to extreme weather forecasts, we one session held in the club rooms where we hosted the Marine Mammal Foundation's Marine Environment Litter Program for the third year running, this is a program designed to inspire appreciation of Port Phillip Bay's amazing marine biodiversity, while highlighting the impact of our litter to encourage action and create long-lasting behavior change to protect our unique marine life, including the amazing Burrunan dolphin. We were fortunate enough for our own senior age manager Marcus Hansson share his knowledge gained as a LSV trainer on wave, wind, and rips.

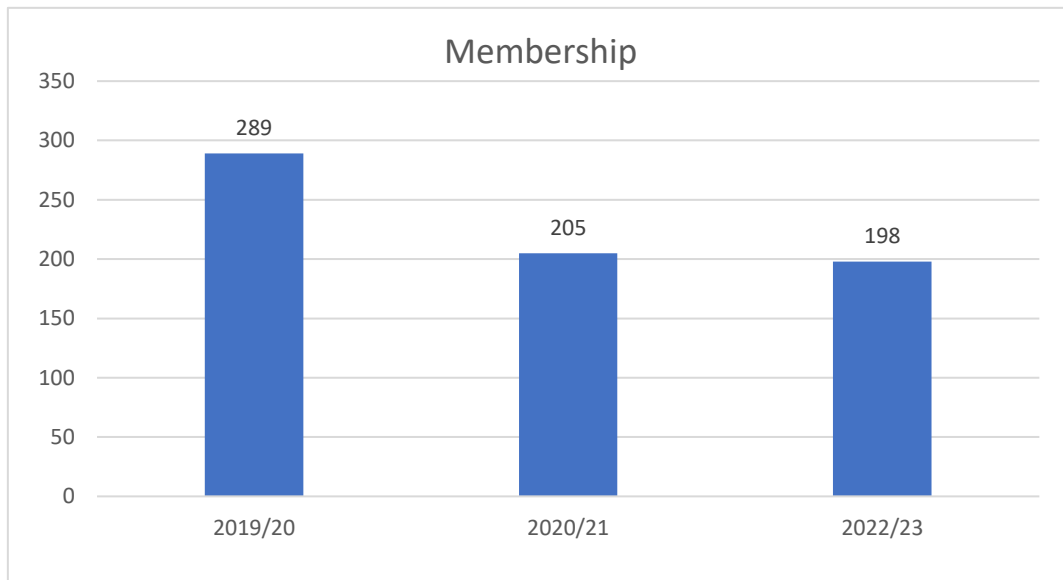

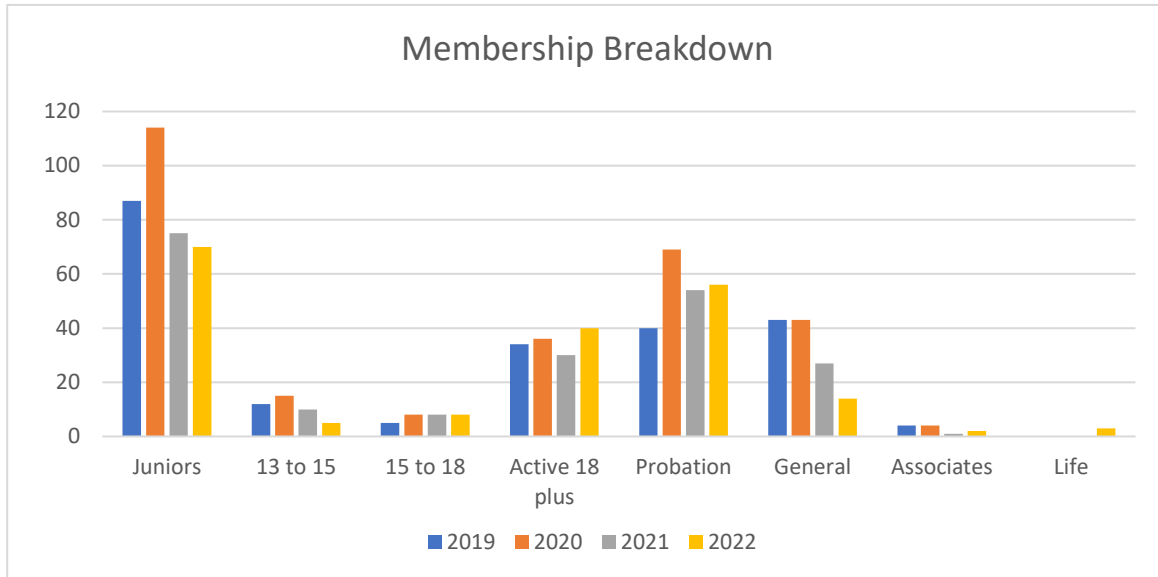


The club continues to see strong demand for new memberships with a lot of families joining our club with new nippers. The younger age groups in particular continue to be oversubscribed.

2022 -2023 IRB COMPETITION REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present this IRB competition update.

Once again, we competed under the banner of Seaford LSC, with Seaford caps on the beach. This has generally been rotated every couple of years to be fair to both Seaford and Frankston LSC.

This year has seen the formal introduction of a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to solidify the structure of how we operate. This documents a name change every two years. Next year we will compete under the Frankston cap.

The combined Frankston/Seaford IRB competition team is now into its eight consecutive season (Excluding lockdowns) and is going from strength to strength. We now have healthy member numbers from Carrum and Aspendale to complement the Frankston and Seaford members. This has generated a real district feel.

This season we competed in 22 finals, netting 3 first place pennants.

Our woman's A team has remained a solid and competitive team especially in the U23 arena, for the full season we also managed to introduce a second woman's team. The men's teams have also grown with at least two entries per carnival. Our men's A team is making good progress and is knocking on the door for finals.

With two teams in both men's and woman's events we were able to run team's rescue events.

Our "Old Gold" master team made an appearance at both states and Aussies, showing age is no barrier to participation...!

Our girls cleaned up in the U23 competition, taking out the overall season championship in both the surf rescue and the mass rescue.

They were poised to perform well in the finals at states before the event was cancelled due to weather, starting positions in both rescue and mass finals.
